From Small Town Pizza Shop to Regional Producer

The story of a North Dakota business built on quality, commitment, and community

Jimmy's Frozen is a growing frozen pizza factory located in Hatton, North Dakota. It is owned by Jim and Jana Gordon, whose family has been building the Jimmy's Pizza legacy for nearly forty years.

Jimmy's Pizza started on January 3, 1986, when the first store opened in a small northern Minnesota town. From the beginning, the focus was on high-quality ingredients and reliable hometown delivery. The idea gained popularity quickly. Family members joined the business, new stores opened, and by 1996, Jimmy's Pizza had become a federally franchised company.

Expansion Into Frozen Production

In 2015, after 30 years of operation, the company acquired the long-standing Bonita's Frozen Pizza Factory in Hatton, North Dakota. This enabled it to expand into high-quality frozen pizza manufacturing. The plant received upgraded production equipment in 2020 with support from the Economic Development Association of North Dakota and was awarded the 2025 Project of the Year.

Technology Supporting Daily Operations

The Hatton facility relies on strong, consistent Internet service to communicate with customers, suppliers, and vendors. Their large building requires coverage that reaches every corner, especially during busy production days. Dependable fiber broadband from Polar enables the team to coordinate orders, manage logistics, and stay connected without interruptions.

Jimmy's Frozen utilizes Polar camera systems to monitor both inside and outside their facility. The high clarity helps them maintain a safe work environment and oversee production areas, loading zones, and deliveries. With mobile access through our app, owners can view cameras from anywhere, ensuring peace of mind even when they are off-site.

A Team-Focused, High-Output Operation

The company has about 20 employees, including production workers, drivers, and support staff. A van shuttle takes employees from out of town to work and back on production days, and the company offers a free lunch and paid drive time.

Corey Olson serves as the General Manager, providing steady leadership and daily operations oversight. He is supported by a hardworking, dedicated management team that works closely with him to keep the facility

running smoothly. Their commitment and teamwork are essential to the company's success. According to the Gordons, "Jimmy's Frozen truly couldn't do it without them."

Production operates two to four days a week, averaging about 10,000 pizzas daily. Additional days are dedicated to sauce making, packaging, and prepping. They produce frozen pizzas for 14 different companies and tailor recipes, ingredients, labels, and packaging to suit each customer. Five trucks deliver finished products across the region.


Fresh Ingredients and Friendly Service

Today, Jimmy's Pizza can be found in its full-service restaurants, convenience stores, bars, select supermarkets, and express locations throughout the Midwest. The company also provides successful fundraising programs that give schools, teams, and organizations an easy way to earn money.

Looking ahead, the Gordon family plans to keep combining fresh ingredients with friendly service to serve great pizza to families for many years. Whether handling deliveries, managing inventory, or ensuring safety at their facility, Jimmy's Frozen continues to grow backed by Polar technology that works just as hard as they do.

Scholarship Opportunities

To support continuing education for rural youth, we are happy to offer high school students the opportunity to apply for the following scholarships:

FOUNDATION FOR RURAL SERVICE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Since 1994, the Foundation for Rural Service (FRS) has aimed to assist people and communities in rural areas that receive telephone and broadband service from members of NTCA—the Rural Broadband Association. They believe the future of our rural communities is intrinsically linked to the future of our nation as a whole.

FRS annually awards scholarships to rural students for their first year of attendance at a two-year or four-year college or vocational school. To be eligible, all applications require sponsorship by an NTCA—The Rural Broadband Association member company. Since its inception, FRS has awarded over \$1 million in scholarships, empowering rural students to advance their communities with invaluable skill sets and experiences.

The scholarships' values range from \$500 to \$9,000, based on various criteria. One application qualifies a student for all available FRS scholarships.

Application deadline is February 14, 2026.

POLAR JOHN G. WALTERS SCHOLARSHIP

Named after Polar's first general manager, the John G. Walters Scholarship, worth \$2,000 each, will be awarded to fifteen graduating high school seniors from our service area who plan to continue their education at an accredited two-year or four-year college, university or vocational-technical school. Parents or guardians must be Polar customers in good standing with voice or Internet service.
